

Course Overview

This course is designed to introduce students to the French language and the various cultures of French-speaking areas. Students will build skills in understanding, speaking, reading and writing French. The units covered are intended to develop more accurate communication, confidence in the language and basic conversational skills. At the end of the course, students should be able to introduce themselves, talk about their activities, and ask simple questions.
